The Segal family—father Aron, mother Erna, and their children Hugo, Gerda, and Manfred—moved from Vienna to Berlin in the mid-1920s. They lived a comfortable, middle-class life in a large apartment at Am Stadtpark 12, at the corner of Kielblockstraße, in the Lichtenberg district. Aron Segal worked as a property manager and, together with his wife, operated a fur shop in the Friedrichshain district.

After the Nazis came to power in 1933, the family's living conditions deteriorated dramatically. Rent payments ceased, credit was denied, their business was boycotted, and the children faced discrimination and harassment at school. An attempt to emigrate to Chile was unsuccessful. In 1939, their son Hugo fled to Belgium, where he was later denounced.

Beginning in late 1942, the remaining members of the family were forced to live illegally in hiding in Berlin until the end of the war. With the help of a network of supporters—and through caution, resilience, and luck—they survived persecution, denunciation, hunger, and aerial bombardment. After the war, they learned that their son Hugo had been murdered at Auschwitz in 1942. Life remained difficult for the Segal family in the postwar years, and in 1949 they decided to emigrate to the United States.

We hope to welcome descendants of their son Manfred from the United States to attend the Stolperstein installation.
